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Employers Honored for Providing Construction Internships

Local firms help students of CRT's Capital City YouthBuild

Community Renewal Team's Capital City YouthBuild thanked five local firms on May 12 for their support of low-income students who are learning the construction trade. These employers have provided internships where youth work and learn alongside professional peers, for a minimum of 25 hours per week.

At an event held at The Metropolitan District's training center, CRT students presented plaques to Jeffrey Mongillo of Manafort Brothers Inc.; Michael Jefferson of MDC - The Metropolitan District; Mark Swiatowiec of New England Construction; Jerado Reynolds of Reynolds Welding & Fabrication; and Donna Campise of Tymatt Excavation.

"We're very impressed with these young people," said Swiatowiec. Referring to Myesha Anderson, age 19, he said, "Within two weeks, she will be driving a huge milling machine down Franklin Avenue." All of the firms said that they would accept YouthBuild interns in the future, and recommend this program to others in the industry.

YouthBuild is a national model that provides academic support, vocational skills and case management to out-of-school youth, helping them get back on track and gainfully employed. The CRT program offers two career tracks: Certified Nursing Assistants and construction careers. Classroom and field experiences help prepare the students for success in their internships.

"Our students can be real assets to the employers. By the time they go out to their construction internships, they have their OSHA-10 certificates and have completed their Home Builders Institute (HBI) PACT certification," said Christopher McCluskey, the Vice President of Housing and Community Services for CRT.

Jefferson of MDC, who serves on the YouthBuild Advisory Council, helped to line up potential employers to take interns. The YouthBuild program pays a stipend that covers 25 hours per week for the first six weeks that the student is in the placement. Additional hours are covered by the employer.



Anthony Mendoza has been placed at Reynolds Welding, where the owner says he has great potential. Reynolds and Swiatowiec both said they could see these students moving into positions that pay at least \$20 per hour.
